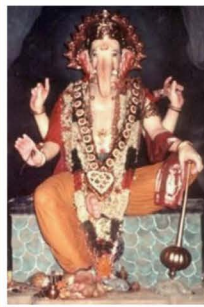

LALBAUGCHA RAJA - PRIDE OF MUMBAI



Lalbaugcha Raja is a popular Ganesha idol of the Lalbaugcha Raja Sarvajanic Ganeshotsav Mandal. The mandal was founded in 1934 at Lalbaug Market by fishermen of the Koli community.

The 'mandal' was founded because of a vow (Navas) for construction of the present Lalbaug Market at its existing place. The marketplace at Peru Chawl was shut down in 1932. Hence, the fishermen and vendors who used to sit in the open place vowed to Ganesha to create a permanent place for their market. Aided by Kuwarji Jethabhai Shah, Shyamrao Vishnu Bodhe, V. B. Korgaonkar, Ramchandra Tawate, Nakhawa Kokam Mama, Bhausaheb Shinde, U. A. Rao and the local residents, landlord Rajabai Tayyabali agreed to dedicate a plot for the market. The fishermen and traders established the Ganesha idol on 12 September 1934 in gratitude. The idol was dressed in the customary fashion of fishermen. This idol is believed to fulfil the wishes of devotees. The mandal was formed in the era when the freedom struggle was at its peak.



The Lalbaugcha Raja Ganapati idol has been protected by the Kampli family for over eight decades.



Ratnakar Kampli (the head of the Kampli family) was a sculptor of idols and had roaming exhibitions at festivals across Maharashtra. He began protecting the idol in 1935, when some of his friends recommended his name to the organisers. After his demise in 1952, his eldest son Venkatesh took over and, after his death, Ratnakar Kampli Jr., assumed the responsibility.



Kampli Arts makes the parts of the Lalbaugcha Raja idol at its workshop; these are taken to the display area where they are assembled and painted. Finally, Ratnakar, who is nearly 80 years old, goes to the pandal and draws the eyes. The height is around 5-6 meters (18-20 feet).

Few days before Ganesh Chaturthi, a Mukh Darshan (Holy sighting of the face) ceremony is organized by the mandal. This unveiling is covered by all the national and regional channels.

The two queues for taking blessings of Lalbaugcha Raja are the Navsachi Line and the Mukh Darshanachi Line.

The Navsachi line is for people who want to get their wishes fulfilled. Pilgrims go on the stage, touch the feet of the idol, and receives the blessings of Ganesha. This line attracts a huge number of people, politicians and celebrities. It takes around 25-30 hours and sometimes up to 40 hours (nearly 2 days) to get darshan in this line. 300-400 volunteers every year support the event.

The second line is meant for Mukh Darshan, to view the idol without going onto the stage. It can take 5-8 hours or longer to get darshan in this line, especially on weekends.

INDIAN RAILWAYS TRAINS' COLOUR CODES:

Trains in Indian Railways have coaches of different colours.

DO YOU KNOW

There is a reason for these particular colours to be used and there is a massive difference in the coaches themselves. Yes, the different colours denote different coach models. Even the colour of the stripes on the side of the coaches denotes something very important.

BLUE-COLOURED ICF COACH

A vast majority of trains in the Indian Railways use the Blue-coloured coaches. This denotes that it is an ICF coach. ICF here stands for Integral Coach Factory at Perambur near Chennai which is where the design for these coaches was developed.



It is the most conventional coach in India and is seen across mails, expresses and other passenger trains. These coaches have a tested top speed of 140km/h and is the entry-level coach in India.



These coaches feature different stripes to show that it serves different purposes. Diagonal yellow or white stripes at the end of the coach above the window line denotes that it is an unreserved general class compartment. The absence of these stripes show that it is a sleeper coach.



LHB COACHES & THEIR DIFFERENT COLOURS

LHB here stands for Linke-Hofmann-Busch which is the company that first designed these coaches. The company is based in Poland and produces its coaches in Germany. The first batch of coaches was imported and then the Indian Railways developed their own version of the design, christening it LHB.

These coaches are made of stainless steel and aluminium which makes them lighter than ICF. This also means, it can go faster. Though it could go up to 200km/h, the Indian Railways has only tested it up to 180km/h and have been operated at speeds of up to 160km/h. Once again, different colours mean different operating capabilities.



LHB RAJDHANI

These coaches are Red in colour with a Grey shade at the bottom and on top.



LHB HUMSAFAR

These are the trains that look out of the ordinary and are a rare find. The coaches have a unique blue vinyl with orange and green at the bottom.



LHB SHATABDI

LHB Shatabdi coaches use a shade of light blue with grey on top and at the bottom.



LHB GATIMAAN

The Gatimaan is one of the newest additions to the Indian Railways and is known for its sheer speed. The train regularly clocks over 150km/h. It has blue coaches and with grey at the bottom and a yellow stripe where the grey begins.'



LHB DOUBLE-DECKER

This is one of the most unique trains in India and currently runs on only a few select routes. It is a double-decker with seats instead of sleepers thereby signifying a relatively short journey. It is decked in yellow and orange.



LHB TEJAS

The Tejas is one of the most modern coaches in the Indian Railways. The doors of the coaches are automated and the coaches feature unique yellow and orange vinyl with an interesting pattern.



LHB DURONTO

Multiple colours on the side of the coaches characterise the LHB Duronto. It is too complicated to be a paint job and hence is a vinyl wrap.



LHB ANTYODAYA EXPRESS

These are LHB coaches and the entire Antyodaya Express is unreserved, making it unique in the way it operates. The coaches are red in colour and feature yellow at the window line.



THOUGHTS ON INDIAN RAILWAYS TRAINS & THEIR UNIQUE COLOUR CODES

India is a vast country and the rail network needed to connect the country is equally massive. It is little surprise then, that the Indian Railway is the largest employer in the world. It is said that the Indian Railways operates 22,593 trains on a regular basis. These are excluding the trains that are scheduled during special times.

With such a large number of trains, colour coding them and keeping the colours simple and easy to understand is a challenge that the Indian Railways has absolutely aced.

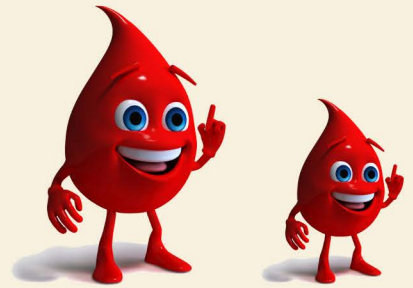

BLOOD TYPES



WHICH BLOOD TYPES ARE COMPATIBLE?

You can receive blood from a donor with the same blood type as you. You can also receive blood from a donor with a compatible blood type. Similarly, a person with a different blood type to you may be able to safely receive your blood.

O negative blood is known as the universal blood type because it is safe for everyone to receive O negative red cells. How do blood types work?

Your blood group is inherited from genes passed on by your parents.

The two most important blood group systems for transfusion are ABO and Rh.

The ABO group system gives the letter part of your blood type and Rh system gives the positive or negative part.



WHAT ARE THE RAREST BLOOD TYPES?

There are eight main blood types but some are rarer than others. The list below shows the percentage of donors with each blood type:

O POSITIVE: 35%	A POSITIVE: 30%
O NEGATIVE: 13%	A NEGATIVE: 8%
B POSITIVE: 8%	AB POSITIVE: 2%
B NEGATIVE: 2%	AB NEGATIVE: 1%

THE ABO GROUP SYSTEM

There are four main blood groups in the ABO group system. Each group is important and we need donors from every group to ensure we have the right blood for the people who need it.

Which group you belong to depends on the antigens and antibodies in your blood.

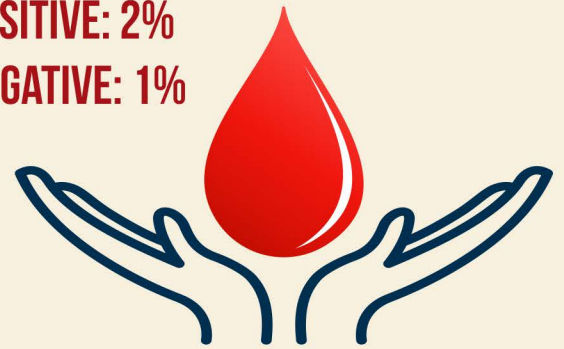
Antigens are a combination of sugars and proteins that coat the surface of a red blood cell.

You also have antibodies in the clear part of blood called plasma.

Antibodies are important in transfusion because they are the body's natural defence system. They recognise any 'foreign' antigens and tell your immune system to destroy them.

That's why giving someone blood from the wrong ABO group can be life-threatening.

It is the presence of A and B antigens and corresponding antibodies that determines your ABO blood group.



POSITIVE OR NEGATIVE BLOOD

The D antigen in the Rh system determines whether you have positive or negative blood.

If you have the Rh D antigen, your blood type is positive. If you lack the Rh D antigen, your blood type is negative.

77% of our donors are Rh D positive.
