WHY DON'T WE RING THE BELL WHILE RETURNING FROM THE TEMPLE.

The Hindu religion has rules and regulations for worshipping, which must be adhered to strictly if one wants to derive the benefits of their worship.

One of these rules is the ringing of the bell as one enters the temple for worship.

Every Hindu temple has a bell and whenever the people go to the temple and return from there, they ring the bell. But did you know that one should never ring the bell while returning from the temple. Most people are unaware as to why the bell should not be rung while returning from the temple. Let us find out the reason behind this rule.

Why do we ring the bell in temples?

Sound is related to energy is. It is believed that whenever we ring the temple bell, positive energy is transmitted to the person ringing the bell and also upon the people around. Along with Vastu Shastra, it is also mentioned in Skanda Purana that when we ring the temple bell, it is similar to the sound of 'Om'. The sound of 'Om' is considered pure, sacred and associated with positive energy, hence there is a tradition of ringing the bell while entering the temple.

Why do we not ring the temple bell while leaving the temple?

Often you must have seen that many people ring the bell while coming out of the temple, this is considered wrong. According to Vastu Shastra, the bell should not be rung while leaving the temple because by doing so you leave the positive energy of the temple, behind in the temple itself leave the temple empty handed. Hence the bell should not be rung while leaving the temple.

Why should the bell be rung while entering the temple?

In Sanatan Dharma, importance has been given to worship since ancient times. According to Hindu religious beliefs, when we ring the bell while entering the temple, it is believed that the sound of the bell destroys all the negative energy in our body and also opens the doors of happiness and prosperity for the people. It is also said that God loves the sound of bells and by ringing the bell, devotees seek permission from the God to enter the temple and draw the attention of the deities towards themselves and then worship them.

It is said that by ringing the bell, the devotee informs the deity of his/her arrival. The sound of the bell is considered auspicious which welcomes divinity and dispels evil. The sound of the bell is said to disengage mind from ongoing thoughts thus making the mind more receptive.

The sound of the bell is also said to destroy all the bacteria and viruses present in the body and the surrounding environment, thereby purifying the temple and its surrounding environment.

When should we ring the temple bell?

It is written in the scriptures that we must ring the temple bell in the morning and the evening. Ringing the bell in the morning and evening removes negative energy from the house. Therefore, we should ring the bell in our house regularly, before starting the worship.

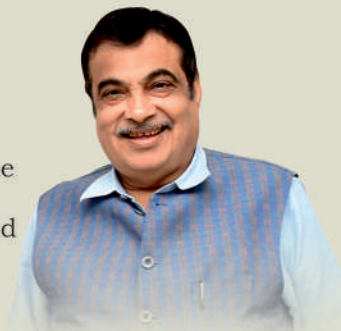
Nirmala Sitharaman- Finance; Corporate affairs

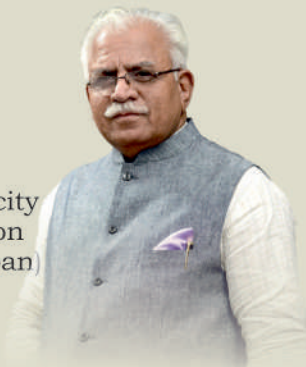

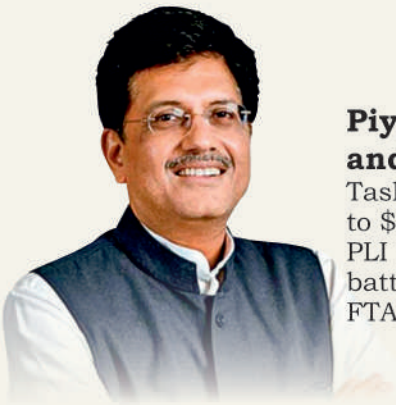

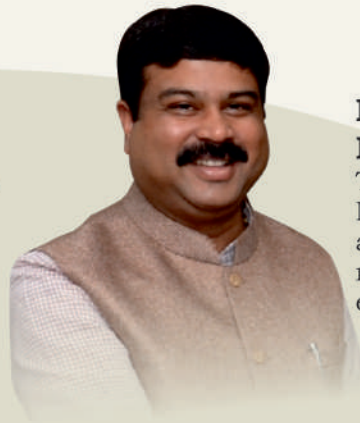
